Hello blog readers!

Did you know that you are probably a criminal? No, I don't mean you are a murderer or a thief. I've just seen a documentary about crime. The TV presenter said that most people broke the law frequently. He said that thousands of people were probably committing crimes right then! He explained that many of them didn't even know they were doing it, but that the police could still arrest them!

Here are some examples of crimes:

Singing Happy Birthday

That's right. Singing the *Happy Birthday* song could be a crime. There is a copyright on the song, meaning it belongs to someone. To use a copyrighted song, you must pay money. The presenter said that no one would arrest you for singing it in your home, but that you had to be careful about singing it in large groups.



Tasting Food at the Supermarket

Have you ever taken a cherry or a grape at the supermarket? Many people taste products before they buy them. But this is actually stealing. So next time, ask for permission first!

Taking Home Part of Nature

You probably think it's OK to take a pretty stone or piece of wood home with you. But if you found those things in a nature reserve, it could be a crime. Everything in the reserve is protected by law, and for a good reason. For you, it's just one stick or stone – but thousands of people visit each reserve. If each person took just one stick or stone, it wouldn't take long for a whole forest to disappear!
